


Project Enye (ñ)

Project Enye (ñ) is a new media, multi-platform documentary project about first-generation American Latinos with at least one parent from a Spanish-speaking country, aka **Enyes (ñ)s**.

Co-created by first-time Enye (ñ) filmmaker Denise Soler Cox and four-time Emmy Award winner and Academy Award nominated documentarian Henry Ansbacher,

Project Enye (ñ) uses familial and cultural stories to build a sense of community among one of the fastest growing populations in the US today.

Each week, the project pre-releases documentary segments to their audience via multiple formats, including 3-5 minute video micro-docs, podcasts, blogs, and live community presentations.

Each micro-doc presents a unique, intimate, first-person, narrative from a diverse cross-section of America's 16 million Enyes (ñ)s.

Although the specifics of each story vary widely, universal truths are revealed that resonate with large Latino and mainstream audiences.

Later this year, Project Enye (ñ) will release the documentary, which chronicles Denise Soler Cox's self-identity journey and interweaves segments gathered from hundreds of hours spent interviewing Enyes (ñ)s along the way. Project Enye (ñ) uses familial and cultural stories to build a sense of community among one of the fastest growing populations in the US today.

We're putting Enyes (ñ)s on the MAP!

By our conservative estimates there are 16 million Enyes (ñ)s in the US today! Our goal for 2015 is to inspire 160,000 Enyes (ñ)s across the country to stand up and be counted. That's just 1% of the Enye (ñ) population. The goal of this initiative is to show the widespread presence and diversity of Enyes (ñ)s in the United States and to cultivate sense of community among them.
